Sept. 7 Martha Gallahue, "2014-15 Essex Ethical Season: Creativity in Practice"

Martha will review and update the community on the progress of our upcoming initiative on Ethical Education. Borrowing from Jane Goodall, the platform will use "from roots to shoots" approach to the topic. She will open the second half of her talk to questions and recommendations. This represents a part II to the June 8th platform delivered by Dale McGowan, American Ethical Union's National Director of Ethical Education.

Martha is member of the AEU's National Leader's Council, where she is kept apprised of the progress of ethical education throughout the country. She recently participated in a family sleepover at New York Society for Ethical Culture.

Sept. 14 Ed Barocas, "Privacy and Technology in the Digital Age"

Ed Barocas will "breathe life into the Bill of Rights." Coming from the perspective of his long involvement as Legal Director for the American Civil Liberties Union of New Jersey, he will explore the issues raised by the Edward Snowden's exposure of NSA spying and its impact on personal privacy, domestic policy, and international relations.

As ACLU-NJ Legal Director, Ed Barocas manages more than 30 cases, which touch every corner of civil liberties including free speech, religious freedom, equal protection, privacy, reproductive freedom and due process of law.

Sept. 21 Jeannie Ginsberg, "My Life's Work"

A conversation with legendary early childhood educator Jeannie Ginsberg (recipient of an Essex County Legends award last year). Ginsberg, founder and long-time leader of the Playhouse Cooperative Nursery School, originally in South Orange, made peace and compassion the central principles of her work. She will outline her vision for education based on individual learning and learning through play and how that vision evolved over the course of her life. "Jeannie and the parent volunteers worked together to create an environment that focused on individual learning, learning through play and peace and compassion for children." Ginsberg (who is turning 95 in Sept.) was the school's education director for almost 50 years and retired in the late 1990s. [If Jeannie Ginsberg is indisposed that day, we will have a colloquy on education, with a focus on peace in recognition of UN International Day of Peace.]

Sept. 28 E. Betty Levin, "One Ebullient Camper: Lay Leadership Training in the Smoky Mountains"

we are going to choose to change how we operate...not because we are in crisis but because we can.

In doing so, we are not revisioning our purpose, rather we are revitalizing our practice. So, we want to come together (and please do come at 11 a.m. where the seeds of the discussion will begin), having reflected upon three things: What direction do we want to take? What is working in this Society continues to inspire us? What kind of leadership best suits our ethical direction based upon what works so well right now. Rather than lead this conversation, I am committed to asking the questions, holding a safe space for all ideas to find space, and supporting courageous out of the box thinking. It is the leadership style that suits me...now let us look at the great member leadership and make ourselves the freshest organic stew during this 2014-5 season, only we in ethical culture can cook up.

I'm so excited to be part of this exercise.

Social Action Summer Brainstorming

The Social Action committee met on July 22 at the Society Building for general discussion about plans for the coming year and a report on our ongoing work with immigrant detainees and First Friends, the New Jersey organization that tries to help undocumented people who have been detained in our jails.

The committee began by agreeing to continue this work with First Friends, particularly our pen pal project and a new project of writing brief notes in English and Spanish to be included in packets First Friends distributes to new detainees. These packets have stationery, stamps, etc, and, according to the director of First Friends, these simple expressions of support and hope are very meaningful to the new detainees, even though they never meet or hear again from the person who wrote the note.

Next, the Committee voted to support the Interim Leader's adult education series called

Ethical Eating, making use of our relationship with Margaret Noon, the organic farmer, and our relationship with the regional branch of the organization Slow Foods.

We spent the bulk of the meeting discussing other possibilities for next year. In general, our committee works both on large public issues and on concrete, local ones. For example, for our service component, we have a relationship with Valley Settlement House in Orange — we do a fall/winter coat collection for them and a spring arts supplies collection — but we are now thinking of some other possible service they might need. Should we schedule a meeting with their staff? We also have done work with the Parenting Center in the SOMA school district. Might we put ourselves on a list of groups to call when there are emergencies and families have concrete needs?

Next, we discussed global and national social action issues that we might take action on during the coming year. The idea would be to focus on one issue for letter writing, possible platform speakers, etc. for one season. Ideas included international child labor, voting rights in the U.S., and various international women's issues. Ideas pending from our June meeting include more work on the cost of phone calls for all prisoners in New Jersey (not only immigrant detainees), and passing legislation about capping carbon emissions.

We encourage the whole Ethical Culture Community as well as committee members to give us their ideas.

Our meetings this year will continue to be after platform on the first Sunday of the month starting in October. — *Meredith Sue Willis*

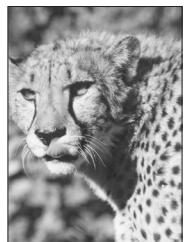

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We continue to collect children's books, canned and boxed foods, and toys for distribution by the Parenting Center in Maplewood.



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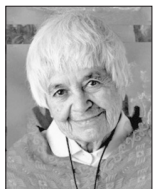
Sept. 7 Martha Gallahue, Opening Day, "2014-15 Essex Ethical Season: Creativity in Practice"
